Local Store Robbed

Last Friday, Clawson's grocery store was robbed of over 200 donuts by two armed men. The robbery occurred at about 7:15 in the morning. Both robbers were described as being tall, light skinned and carrying Sociology textbooks. One was also carrying a lunch bag.

Taken in the hold-up were 75 grape jellies, 35 custard filled, 47 long johns, and 57 chocolate covered.

After the robbery, the thieves escaped in a beat-up Chevy, heading eastward on Ayrault Road. Mr. Clawson did not pursue the robbers because he had previously locked his keys in his car. Sheriff's deputies are still looking for the robbers and have no clues as to their whereabouts.

Court Affirms Discipline

WASHINGTON - The Supreme Court handed down a decision today that would allow students to spank their teachers. The court ruled that if circumstances are right, students may be justified in using corporal punishment on their instructor. In his opinion, Chief Justice Warren Burger said, "If a teacher misleads a class, whether it be intentionally or accidentally, or is disruptive to class socializing, physical punishment may be warranted." He warned though that the discipline must be administered without regard to the subject being taught.

deep deep

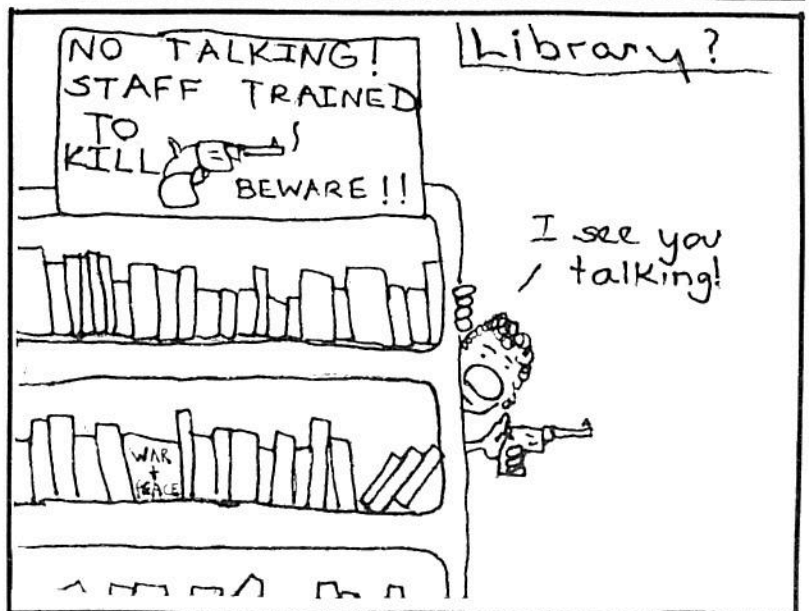
Movie Review
